What is the Black **Plays Archive?**

The Black Plays Archive (BPA) has been cataloguing the UK premieres of professional productions of plays by Black British, African and Caribbean playwrights since 2013. The online database holds records of over 800 plays, 65 audio recordings, a podcast, essays, Q&A's, films and more.






