The National Theatre is a large concrete building on the South Bank in London. It has three theatre spaces called the Olivier, Lyttelton, and Dorfman.

The address is: **Upper Ground, London, SE1 9PX**.



The nearest **train** and **underground** stations are:

- Waterloo
- London Blackfriars
- Embankment



The National Theatre has an underground car park. There is free parking available for Blue Badge holders.

About the National Theatre Who's who?




When you arrive through the main entrance, the security team will check your bag. You might need to queue for a short time.

There are signs on the walls around the building to help guide you to the theatre.



There are lots of staff available in the building if you have questions or if you would like directions to your seats.


National Theatre staff wear black t-shirts with white writing.



The Lyttelton has two levels of audience seating: The **stalls** (lower level) or the **circle** (upper level).

Length


Alterations is 1 hour and 55 minutes long. There is no interval.

Alterations was written in **1978** and therefore contains historic language and themes that some people may find upsetting.




What Happens in the Play? The set

Alterations is set in two spaces in an alterations shop, based in London and run by Walker Holt.



The shop is crowded with bags of trousers, sewing machines, and racks of colourful clothes. In some scenes, Walker imagines a bigger shop. Throughout the play, the characters bring on more and more bags full of trousers.

What Happens in the Play? The characters

Darlene



Horace

There is also a small ensemble of characters who appear outside the shop. They appear as visions of the past, present and future.

What Happens in the Play? The characters

Walker and **Darlene** emigrated from Guyana to England. They are married and have a daughter called **Janet** (Janet does not appear onstage).

Buster came to England on the same boat as Walker. He works with Walker in the shop as a tailor.

Courtney is a young van driver who works for Walker. He was born and raised in London

Horace is also a tailor from Guyana. He used to be good friends with Walker.

Mr Nat is a businessman who supplies work for Walker. He had to leave Europe many years earlier to find safety as a Jewish person.

What Happens in the Play? Synopsis

Buster phones a maternity ward to find out if his wife has given birth to their baby yet. Buster is Walker's colleague and friend.

Walker explains to
Buster and Courtney
that they need to work
late to finish a huge
task. Businessman Mr
Nat has asked Walker to
alter hundreds of pairs
of trousers. If Walker
succeeds, he will earn
enough money to buy
the shop he is renting.



Walker hires Horace, who is a tailor, to help them complete the order. Buster reminds Walker that he and Horace do not work well together.

The shop phone rings. It's Liz, who is Walker's girlfriend. Buster asks Walker how his wife, Darlene, feels about Walker having a girlfriend.

Horace enters and turns off Walker's blues music. Walker can't pay Horace until the end of the month, so Horace demands an extra £100.

At lunch, Horace and Courtney watch horse racing on TV. Horace tells everyone that he is a filmmaker as well as a tailor now.



Darlene enters and tells Walker that she has lost her job, because she has been taking too much time off to look after their daughter, Janet. She asks Walker for financial support. Walker does not feel able to give Darlene any money, because he needs everything to buy the shop.



As Darlene leaves, Horace secretly gives her some money.

The team continue to work, but Horace has had enough and wants to leave. He has theatre tickets and is interested in acting. Walker tells Horace that he is kidding himself by wanting to be an actor. Horace is offended and leaves.

Horace goes to see Darlene. He loves her, and tells her that he would look after her if she left Walker, but Darlene is not sure if she is ready.



Back in the shop, Buster wants to leave to go and visit his wife in hospital. Walker asks him to stay and dreams about going to the cinema back in Guyana.

Darlene comes back to the shop. Walker again says he will not give her any money to support Janet. Darlene dreams about what her life could have been like if she had stayed in Guyana and opened a restaurant.

Mr Nat enters suddenly. He is furious. The trousers that have been returned to him have been sewn together by Horace. Walker tries to explain.



Mr Nat explains to Walker how hard he has worked to be successful and that he cannot take any risks with who he works with. Walker promises to fix the trousers. Darlene offers to help, but Walker shouts at her.

Darlene and Mr Nat have a drink together and discuss their marriages. Mr Nat then decides to give Walker another chance.



Walker asks to come home with Darlene, but she tells him to sleep alone.

Walker dreams of a bigger shop with more clients and staff. His vision appears around him and reminds him to keep working.

The next day, Courtney finds Walker in the shop. Walker worked overnight. Courtney tells him about the racism he faces on the estate where he lives



When Buster arrives, Walker explains what has happened with Horace's work.

As they continue working on the trousers, Walker tells Buster his dream for the shop: making suits for trendy, young and successful people.



Courtney brings in even more bags of trousers that need to be altered. Buster and Walker work frantically to complete the order. They need another person to help.

Courtney explains to Buster and Walker how hard it is to be young and black in Britain. Walker does not want to hear it. He tells Courtney that he would be happy if he did not come back to the shop.

Horace returns and asks to speak with Walker about Darlene, but they do not get a chance. Horace and Walker provoke each other and Buster has to calm them down.

As the team work on the final batch of trousers, Darlene enters. She tells Walker that Horace wants to marry her.



Horace and Walker fight, but Darlene is determined to leave Walker. She exits with Horace.

Mr Nat arrives with a cheque for Walker. Walker asks Mr Nat if all the work was worth it, if it cost him his family.



Buster starts to celebrate with Walker, but he needs to get to hospital to see his wife. Walker phones the hospital for him, and tells Buster that his wife has had a son. Buster celebrates and leaves.

Walker phones the estate agents to arrange to buy the shop.

What Happens in the Play? Sonic Story

The graphic on the next page tells the **sonic story** of **Alterations**. It highlights any particularly **loud or quiet** moments, or any moments when there are **sudden changes** to the sound.

Sound summary

Alterations is a play with some music.

- There are sudden volume changes throughout the play
- Loud music plays in the foyers and auditorium before and after the performance
- There are sudden volume changes throughout the play
- Characters sometimes shout or speak over each other.





Relaxed Performance Access information

There is a relaxed performance of **Alterations** on **Monday 24 March** at **7.30pm**.

This performance will take place in a **relaxed environment**. This means:

- Some of the lighting and sound effects have been adjusted to be less sudden or intense
- The auditorium lights will remain on during the show at a low level
- You are welcome to leave and re-enter the auditorium if you need to
- You are welcome to move around or make noise
- We have ear defenders and fidget toys available to use.
 Just ask a member of staff who will direct you to the access desk
- There is a quiet room and chill-out space available, which staff can direct you to
