FIRST LOOK AT REHEARSALS FOR *PUBLIC RECORD* CELEBRATING THE SOUND OF SUNDERLAND

The National Theatre today releases first look rehearsal images for *Public Record*, a new Public Acts production developed in collaboration with the National Theatre, Sunderland Culture and Sunderland Empire.

From 25 – 27 April 2025, *Public Record* will transform The Fire Station in Sunderland into a live recording studio to create a new album; a portrait of the city told through its people. The production is a celebration of the sound of Sunderland, depicting its unique musical heritage, life in the city and looking towards its exciting future.

The production features a cast of over 100 people from local community groups, professional dancers and musical legends from across the city who represent the breadth of Sunderland's rich cultural identity.

Sunderland-born musician **Ross Millard** (*The Futureheads*) writes original music for the production alongside Director of Public Acts **Emily Lim**, co-director and choreographer **Dan Canham** and writer **Stewart Pringle**.

An incredible line up of local professional musicians also featuring in the production include Folk singer **Dave Murray**, **David & Peter Brewis** (*Field Music*), **Barry Hyde** (*The*

Futureheads), **Sarah Hayes**, Naijaway Entertainment's Afrobeats DJs **DJ Bykonz & DJ Banko**, **Sophie Lisa Beresford** & Makina DJ **DJ Infinite**.

Public Record is being developed as part of the National Theatre's Public Acts programme, a nationwide initiative creating extraordinary acts of theatre and community. The community groups involved in the production include **Back on the Map**, **Connect Company**, **Sunderland Nigerian Families Group** and **The Odyssey Alumni Group**.



Emily Lim, Director of Public Acts said, "We are having such an inspiring time creating *Public Record*. We hope our show will do justice to the amazing passion for music and community that exists in Sunderland. It's a show that explores what it is to live, love, lose and grow together, and we can't wait to share it with everyone."

Ross Millard, Composer and Musical Director said, "It's going to be spectacular, a special moment for Sunderland and a real celebration of the city. The audience will be put through a whole gamut of emotions and I'm sure they'll feel very proud of their city. There are so many different musical styles and genres involved – something for everyone".

Public Record takes place at The Fire Station in Sunderland from 25 – 27 April 2025. Tickets are on sale now at www.thefirestation.org.uk

About Public Acts

Public Acts is the National Theatre's nationwide initiative to create extraordinary acts of theatre and community. We make artistically excellent, ambitious and inclusive participatory theatre in partnership with those who share our vision for change.

Public Acts builds sustained partnerships with theatres and community organisations across the UK who share our vision of theatre as a force for change. The programme was first established in 2017 with our founding partner theatre Queens Theatre Hornchurch and has since partnered with Restoke in Stoke-on-Trent, Cast in Doncaster, Trowbridge Town Hall, Trybe House Theatre in London, Sunderland Culture and Sunderland Empire in Sunderland. Through these partnerships, and in collaboration with theatre artists and professional performers, community members come together to make ambitious large-scale performances. Community members take part in regular workshops, theatre trips and creative social opportunities.

To celebrate the fifth anniversary of Public Acts in 2023, *The Odyssey* was reimaged as an epic, multi-venue production made in collaboration with hundreds of community members and professional artists from across the country. The production was told in five episodes in five locations by community companies and artists across the country.

Public Acts is inspired by Public Works at the Public Theater, described as a 'ground-breaking programme of participatory theatre in New York', and the visionary participatory work of many theatre companies across the UK in the past decades.

Sunderland Culture

Sunderland Culture was set up in 2016 to bring together the cultural programmes of Sunderland City Council, University of Sunderland and Sunderland Music, Arts and Culture (MAC) Trust into a single, independent, delivery model. Sunderland Culture delivers the programme in National Glass Centre and Northern Gallery for Contemporary Art, Sunderland Museum & Winter Gardens and Arts Centre Washington, as well as cultural engagement and events in communities across the city. The Fire Station

The Fire Station is an exciting, new performance venue in Sunderland that incorporates an auditorium, bars, a restaurant and studios. It has been developed by Sunderland Music, Arts and Culture (MAC) Trust. The new, state-of-the-art auditorium, designed by award-winning architects Flanagan Lawrence, programmes music, theatre, comedy and dance. It can host up to 550 people seated or up to 800 people standing. The Fire Station is at the heart of a transformational £18m cultural redevelopment in the city centre that will include the Parade Ground, a 600-capacity outdoor performance space with an external stage and bar opening in Summer 2022.

The £7m first phase of The Fire Station, the redevelopment of an Edwardian building into a bar and restaurant, studios and heritage exhibition, was built thanks to financial support from National Lottery Heritage Fund, Sunderland City Council and the MAC Trust. The Fire Station Auditorium was developed as phase 2 thanks to a £6.25m award from Arts Council England's Capital: Large Grants programme, funded by the National Lottery, and a £1.38m grant from the government's Cultural Capital Kickstart fund. Further generous support came from Sunderland City Council, the Garfield Weston Foundation, the Catherine Cookson Charitable Trust, the Foyle Foundation, the Wolfson Foundation, and Backstage Trust.
